
Helping to shape Vienna for 85 years

1930's-1940's BY: JENA SCHWARTZE

The beginning of the Vienna FFA Chapter all started in the fall of 1934. The very first agriculture teacher at Vienna was J.C. Webb from 1934-1936. In November of 1934, the "Vo-Ag boys competed at the Belle Fair and did very well considering that this was the first year for Vo-Ag." This article was the first to mention the ag program at VHS. Later on in December, the first act of being in the National FFA Organization was recorded. "Several of the boys are going to order FFA Jackets and emblems to go with them." Ordering the official FFA Jacket was the beginning of the Vienna FFA Chapter.

To start off the new year in 1935, the Vo-Ag department decided on their projects for the year which included sow and litter production, sheep management, lamb production, beef production, beef calves, dairy management, egg production, turkey management, baby chicks, farmstead planning, truck gardening, flock management, and colt management. At the end of the 1934-35 school year, the Vo-Ag program brought in a total of \$2,054.71 for the 35 projects. According to the local newspaper, "This total income represents a sum several times larger than the amount spent by the local district on this department. In fact, the amount is larger than the total sum of the special federal, state, and local money used for the local vo-ag department." This amazing income was great for the first year of the Vienna FFA Chapter.

In 1935 the local hog judging teams received third place in state competition. Then in the following year, nine Vo-Ag boys competed at the State Judging contest again in dairy, livestock, and poultry judging held in Columbia during State Convention. The Vienna Ag department also did soil testings for the community when they added a new lab to the laboratory, in 1936. In April of 37, the Vienna FFA Chapter had a very solid Poultry Judging Team, Livestock Judging Team, Dairy Judging Team, and Horticulture. Members of these teams included Paul Hutchinson, Paul Juergens, Joe Finn, Joe Ragan, Arch Feeler, Lenard Fannon, Tommie Hutchinson, John Leslie Palmer, Elijiah Overlease, and Doyle

Feeler. In June 1937 two of Vienna's ag boys, Paul Jergens and Ray Renfrow, traveled to St. Louis for a Lamb Show with advisor Tennis V. Davis. It is unsure of how the boys did at the contest. Marvin Helms took over as advisor after Davis in 37 and would stay until 41.

In February of 1938, Mr. Helms and his 18 Vo-Ag boys helped around the community by helping cull chickens and drench sheep. The following goals were set for the Vienna FFA Chapter: 1.) Supervised Practice: every boy should have a project, 2.) Community Service: donate the boys' time to local farms and have the boys teach farming practices, 3.) Improvements to be made in the classroom: add a radio to the classroom to keep track of stock markets, 4.) Cooperative Activities, pay FFA dues so boys can participate in activities: 5.) Recreation: have an FFA basketball team and compete against other teams, 6.) Leadership Activities, boys need to attend and participate in the National Corn Husking Contest, judging teams and even compete at the state level, go to the State Fair and enter projects at the State Fair, and also attend the lamb show in St. Louis, 7.) Give consideration to scholastic standing in selecting officers and other leaders. At the end of 38, Professor Marvin Helms was nominated

as the South Central District President. 1941's – 1945's

From 1941-1945, J.F. Boehner was the Ag teacher and advisor for Vienna. In 1943, the first recorded President of the chapter was Andrew Volmert, Vice-President- Harold Hayes, Secretary-Berthel Bray, and Treasurer-John Bauer. During 1943-44, many remarkable moments were created.

The chapter was a part of the State FFA Honor Roll of FFA Chapters, the Chapter budget has also increased to \$3,750.42 with a total of 55 projects, and the Chapter President was nominated as the District Sentinel. From 1945-49. A. Mel Akars was the advisor at Vienna. In 1945, The Vienna FFA Chapter had its first basketball team picture. The members of the team included Raymond Sneed, Ronald Geisler, Norman Ricker, the captain, Jesse Carroll, Julius Feeler, and Neil Snodgrass. During the 1945-46 school year, the ag department increased in membership to a total of 44 boys. There were also 38 boys in the ag program during the 1949 school year. The officer team for that year were President-Lloyd Murphy, Vice-President-Jimmy James, Secretary-Donald Snodgrass, Treasurer-Billy Rowden, Reporter-Gene Wilson, and Sentinel-

Dallas Rollins.

1950's – 1969's

Starting in 1950 there were 38 boys at Maries R-1 who were members of the Vienna FFA Chapter. In that year, 15 of the young men were working on receiving their chapter degree while the remaining 23 gentlemen were to be initiated as Greenhands before the end of the year. Those overseeing the program at the time were chapter president Harold Backeus and instructor Mr. Carl Hogg.

In 1951 Mr. Marvin Helms rejoined the Vo-Ag program and remained the FFA advisor there until 1976. There were still 38 boys in the program and Harold Backeus was still serving as chapter president.

In 1952 the Vienna FFA Chapter got to experience an exciting first. Donley Brown was the first Vienna FFA member to receive the State FFA Degree.

In 1953 the chapter grew in numbers, now hosting 44 young men. Eugene Johnson became the second person to obtain the State FFA Degree. That year at Barnwarming, Betty Irvin was named Queen. Francis Kloppel served as chapter president this year, as well as in 1954. Jimmy Bray and Clyde Henderson Jr. received their State FFA Degree in the year succeeding.

Jumping to 1956, Bob Bassett was serving as president. Jim Kleffner, Robert Wilson, and Meryl G. Woody received the State FFA Degree.

In 1957 there were 64 boys were registered in the agriculture program. The Vo-Ag department received recognition for winning first place at the Illinois-Missouri Show and Sale for having the best exhibit of hogs. Bob Bassett remained chapter president and Norman M. Ragan became the next recipient of the State FFA Degree. The FFA Basketball team made their debut with six players: Tommy Kleffner, Don Burd, Ralph Kloeppel, Shawn Malone, Charley Honse, and Lewis Wilson.

In 1958 and 1959, Edward Redel served as



Vienna FFA members see rewards, surprises during process of gathering chapter's history — Memories made in the Blue Jacket

VIENNA — Officers and members of the Vienna High School Chapter of the Future Farmers of America (FFA) have compiled an extensive history of the 85-year-old Vienna chapter.

Jena Schwartze played a large role in pulling together

people to help with the research. Schwartze said they found information about past presidents, state degree recipients, and chapter awards on plaques in the agriculture room. They looked through the chapter scrapbooks for information. They made trips to the Historical Society of Maries County's research room located in the basement of the courthouse. At the research room they looked through old newspapers and high school yearbooks and found all kinds of interesting photos and articles. They also got information on state and

national awards from DESE. They interviewed past members and Schwartze said, "Thank you to all those we interviewed. You all provided great stories."

There were interesting surprises and highlights that came with their search through all that information. Lily Wagner said she was pleased to find out her mom was the creed speaker in high school. "I am now the creed speaker as well," she said.

Paige Breeding said they saw a calf with two heads, which was surprising.

Jade Kleffner said she was surprised to find out the FFA Chapter had a basketball team and that one of the grassland teams went to the national competition.

Schwartze said in a 1934 newspaper, there was an article stating "Seven Ag Boys purchased jackets with FFA emblems."

Hannah Shanks said she thinks it was really interesting to find her family members and see what they did in FFA. "Its crazy how much the chapter has grown in eighty years."

It was a learning experience as well and the FFA members had their favorite part of the process. Wagner said she liked interviewing people and seeing how much FFA has changed over the years. Breeding said she liked learning the history. Kleffner said her favorite part of the project was learning about her family when they were in FFA.

Tappel said while looking through old newspapers she found the engagement announcement of her grandparents. "I thought that was really cool," she said. Shanks said she liked talking to past members and seeing them reminisce on the memories they made in the blue jacket.

Schwartze said she enjoyed getting to know how the Vienna FFA Chapter has evolved. "We used to be a seven membership of males only in 1934, and 85 years later we have about 100 members with a good majority being female."

As the FFA'ers waded through the information and rich history of their chapter, they realized how much has been done over the past 85 years to continue the FFA Chapter and traditions in their hometown.

"Being a part of this organization has been amazing. It has broadened my horizons after the past four years and I cannot wait to see what other history the chapter makes in the future," Schwartze said.

Tappel said gathering the information for the FFA history was an amazing experience.

Shanks said she is "so proud and honored to be in such a history rich organization. I'm glad to be a part of the chapter's story."

Kleffner said she loves being part of the Vienna FFA. Breeding said it feels "amazing" to be part of such a great organization.

Wagner said it feels amazing to know how great of an organization she is part of. "We are truly blessed to have an amazing organization to be part of."

chapter president. The basketball team had a successful year. They played two games against Dixon and won a game against Iberia 47 to 37.

In 1960, 50 boys were enrolled in the program and Joyce Honse was chosen as Barnwarming Queen. Neil Joesph Kellison received his State FFA Degree in 1961.

In 1963 the enrollment decreased slightly with only 40 boys participating in the program. Kenneth Hollis served as president. Linda Chambers was named Chapter Queen.

In 1964 Roy Ramsey served as president and there were 47 gentlemen in FFA. Linda Burd was named chapter queen. Forty-three boys were in FFA in 1965 and Betty Buschmann was selected as chapter queen. Larry Hollis served as chapter president in 1966. No records were obtained for the years 1967-1968.

Up until this point, women were not allowed to be in FFA because the National FFA Constitution specified that only men could join. However, at the 1969 National FFA Convention, a motion was made to strike the word male from the constitution. By a two-vote margin, the motion carried. Women were now allowed to become members of FFA.

1970's - 1979's

In 1969 women were officially allowed membership into the National FFA Organization. In the 50 years since the formal acceptance of female membership, women have become an integral part of the organization. The first record of a female FFA member in the Vienna FFA history was in 1977. In 1978, the Vienna FFA Chapter recognized Teresa Smith as one of the first woman members of the Vienna FFA Chapter. Later on in 1979, she became the first female officer, the P.R. Chairman.

There were not many activities recorded of the 1970's decade. There were, however, a couple significant ones. The February 1977 newspaper highlighted that the National FFA was organized in Kansas City, and adopted Missouri into the organization in 1929. Also during this time in 1977, the Vienna FFA Chapter celebrated National FFA Week February 20-26. The membership only consisted of about 50 active members at this time.

In August 1977, the Chapter was put in charge of the livestock exhibits for this year's fair. The chapter was granted money to fix the barn and install electrical outlets throughout the facility.

In 1977 the Chapter attended the American Royal in Kansas City. They had been traveling that day and took a wrong turn and ended up landing in the state of Kansas! They turned back and made it to the Royal. They attended a rodeo and had the chance to see the Nashville personality Dolly Parton!

In 1978 the Chapter attended a machinery show in Kansas City at the American Royal. The Chapter also adopted a constitution, proposing one that mainly followed the National one, but with a couple additions. The constitution was ratified by a unanimous vote of the members present.

On the weekend of October 8, the Vienna FFA sold candles to raise money so that the chapter could attend the National FFA Convention in Kansas City. The chapter raised \$771 and were able to attend.

Recorded in the December 1978 newspaper was that the Vienna FFA Chapter built a new trophy case to be placed in the east lobby of the Allen Gymnasium. It was built to keep individual awards and trophies.

The Vienna FFA Chapter organized a "Gilt Chain Program" during the early months of 1977 until the late months of 1978. This al-

lowed members to interview and be screened to receive a gilt. When a gilt would wean eight or more pigs, the chapter would pick one gilt from the litter and give it to one of the seven individuals picked. During 1977, those individuals included: Kenneth Davis, Mike Fanning, Larry Honse, Rick Hoy, Carl Neubert, Todd Schoene and Roger Schulte. The chain turned out to be very successful, and that was when the chapter decided to do it in 1978 mainly for incoming freshman of the chapter. For the 1978 year, the recipients were Donnie Schulte, Paul and Wanda Steinman, Irb Williams, Theresa Smith, Greg Leisman and Randy Quick.

In 1978 the Dairy Judging Team placed third in the competition, which advanced them to state. They were to travel to Columbia to compete. The members consisted of Marvin Wieberg, Dwayne Shanks, Carl Neubert, and Mary Smith. No other Vienna team placed high enough to go to state that year. After competing at state, the Dairy Judging team placed 29th out of 60 teams.

During the Christmas months of 1977 through 1978, the Vienna FFA Chapter began to cut down Christmas trees and place them in the teachers rooms of the elementary school for the kids to enjoy and get into the Christmas spirit. They had distributed 14 trees in 1977.

There were three recorded Star Greenhands during this decade, they were: Mike Fanning 1977, Paul Kleffner 1978, and Michell Eicholz 1979.

Doug Cahill was the President of the Vienna FFA Chapter from 1978-79. When Doug was the President, the Vienna FFA Chapter was only about 30 members, with the vast majority of males and only a few female members. Today the Vienna FFA Chapter has about 100 members and an equal number of males and females in the organization. When Doug was asked about his experience in the chapter and time as President he stated that he learned a lot, he grew as a public speaker, and it was an eye-opening experience. At the time, Kevin Sullivan was his Ag teacher. Doug's most memorable moment would have had to be when he was elected as President. Doug was one of five candidates for the position and the chapter chose him to be the president the next school year, and he was very

honored in that moment. Doug's advice for the current and future FFA members would have to be "Get out everything you can, do everything you can, be involved."

Mike Kleffner was the President of the chapter from 1979-1980 while under the advisement of Mr. Kevin Sullivan. His most memorable moments were when the chapter traveled to conventions, doing judging teams, and winning in the Proficiency award area of Beef Production. His advice for members is to "put in what you want to get out during your time in the chapter and to be involved.

Paul Kleffner was another busy member of the Vienna FFA Chapter that made history. See **History** on Page 6B

Mr. Kleffner was the first Vienna FFA Chapter member to be an Area Officer He served as the Area Treasurer from 1979-1980. When asked about his experience as an Area Officer. Mr. Kleffner stated that he learned a lot about collaboration and teamwork. Along with being an Area officer, Mr. Kleffner also served as the Chapter Treasurer and President. In 1980, Mr. Kleffner also received his State Degree. When he received his State Degree, Mr. Kleffner felt honored and very privileged. His inspiration to receive his State Degree was Kleffner's father, Jim Kleffner, who also received his State Degree in 1956. Mr. Kleffner's advisor was Mr. Kevin Sullivan for a couple years and Mr. Dale Hodges. Mr. Kleffner's Supervised Agricultural Experience included Hog Production. Some teams he participated on the Parliamentary Procedure team, Agronomy Team, and Public Speaking events. Some advice Mr. Kleffner would like to give to members is "Broaden your horizons, be involved in the chapter, push yourself outside of your comfort zone, and join the CDE/LDE teams."

There were also two recorded

amazing FFA Advisors during this time and they were Marvin Helms and Kevin Sullivan. These two pushed FFA members to become all they could be. These two have made a huge impact on the Vienna FFA Chapter. Kevin was the advisor to the first Area Officer recorded in the Vienna FFA. Marvin was there when the first females began to appear. These two have truly made history.

In 1980 the Vienna FFA's officer team was Mike Kleffner-President, Paul Kleffner-Vice-President, Carl Neubert-Secretary, Ken Davis-Treasurer, Theresa Smith-Reporter, and Bryan Rollins-Sentinel. Kevin Sullivan was their advisor for part of the year and Dale Hodges for the rest of the year. In 1980, they had four teams that made it to state: Farm Management team, Ag Mechanics team, Meats team, and the Dairy Cattle team. Kenneth Davis and Paul Kleffner both received their State Degrees and Darryl Schwartze was the Star Greenhand recipient in 1980.

given were the Beef Proficiency award to Mike Kleffner and the State Farmers Degree for Paul Kleffner and Ken Davis. In addition to the individual awards, the Vienna FFA received the Superior Chapter Award. At the 1980 Vienna FFA Barnwarming, Connie Duncan was elected to be the Queen.

In 1980 the FFA participated in a four-school basketball tournament in Belle. St. James, Belle, Fatima, and Vienna all played in the tournament which was hosted by the Belle FFA Chapter.

The 1980 Creed Speaker was Patricia Robbins. To end the year, at the Chapter Banquet, the guest speaker was the National FFA President, Douglas Rinker of Virginia. What a great way to end the year!


In 1981, the FFAOfficer team consisted of Ronnie Woody-President, Donald Schwartze-Vice-President, Darryl Schwartze-Secretary, Mike Smith-Treasurer, Jeff Tellman-Reporter, Kenny Neubert-Sentinel, and Tammy Messersmith-Historian. The FFA Advisor was Mr. Dale Hodges.

Some more interesting facts found in the newspaper was that Vocational Agriculture first became a subject

in 1917 and the FFA was founded nationally in 1928. Another fact is in 1950, FFA operated under a federal charter granted by an Act of Congress.

In 1980, there were four teams that went to State: The Farm Management team of Paul Kleffner, Phillip Wieberg, and Kevin Kloeppel, the Agriculture Mechanics team, which of Kenny Neubert, Kim Elrod, and Ronnie Woody, which Kim Elrod and Kenny Neubert each won gold medals

for placing high individually in the Ag Mechanics contest. The other two teams that went to state were the Meats team of William Stephen (gold metal), Leanna Miller, and Nancy Schwartze, and lastly, the Dairy Cattle team of Darryl Schwartze, Gerald Schwartze, and Jeff Tellman. In November the National FFA Convention was held in Kansas City. Those attending were See **History** on Page 7B

Donald Schwartze, Ronnie Woody, Bill Meier, Mike Smith, Tammy Messersmith, Patricia Rollins, and advisor Dale Hodges. You could say they had a very successful year.

In 1982 the advisor was Dale Hodges. They had four teams that made it to districts: the Farm Management team of Rueben Wieberg, Ronnie Woody, Kenny Neubert, and Donald Schwartze, the Ag Mechanics team of Mike Smith, Kevin Kloeppel, and Leroy Wieberg, the Meats Team of Brad Robertson, Greg Rehagen, Bill Meier, and David Ripka, and the Field Crops Team of Darryl Schwartze, Jeff Tellman, and Gerald Schwartze. Don Schwartze received the State Farmer Degree and Darla Rehagen received the Star Greenhand Award. Rehagen was the very first female to receive this award. In November the National FFA Convention was held in Kansas City. Those attending were Jeff Tellman, Gerald Schwartze, Dale Logan, Kris Lord, and the advisor, Mr. Hodges. They had a very fun trip full of many activities and lots of excitement.

In 1983 Dale Hodges was the advisor. The Officer team members were Jeff Tellman-Sentinel, Gerald Schwartze-Secretary, Brad Robertson-Treasurer, Darryl Schwartze-President, Tammy Messersmith, and Darla Rehagen-Historians. In 1983 only one team made it to State, which was the Field Crop Judging team. They got 5th out of 21 teams. The team members were Darla Rehagen, Melinda Ripka, Jimmie Robbins, and Jeff Schulte. In 1983 Ronnie Woody was the only Vienna FFA member who received the State Degree. Lastly, Richard Messersmith received the Star Greenhand Award.

In 1984 Mr. Hodges continued as the advisor. Andrew Schwartze received the Star Greenhand in 1984. The FFA officers were Larry Kleffner-Reporter, Ginger Stephen-Secretary, Terry Shanks-Treasurer, Melinda Ripka-Vice President, Dale Logan-Sentinel, and Darla Rehagen-President. Ms. Rehagen was the first female to become President of the Vienna FFA Chapter. She was also one of eight girls out of total of 45 Vienna FFA members. This is when girls finally started making their presence felt at all levels. Now the number of girls and boys in equal with a majority of the officers being women. The Vienna FFA Chapter has definitely changed over the past 36 years since 1984.


1985's - 1989's

In 1985 the Vienna FFA Officer Team members were Tim Burd-Sentinel, Mark Buechter-Secretary, Larry Kleffner- President, Doug Rowden-Vice President, Gary Reinkemeyer-Treasurer, and Andy Schwartze. Their great advisor was Mr. Norman Hollis. Melinda Ripka received the State Farmer Degree, the first chapter female to achieve this. She was an involved FFA member. Her SAE, which was called occupational experience project back then, was a herd of 33 head of cattle. Ms. Ripka received the Chapter Greenhand and Chapter Farmer Degree awards prior to her state degree. She was an active and helpful FFA member. William Robertson received the Star Greenhand award in 1985. At the Maries County Fair in September of 1985, there were many successful SAE projects. Project awards included: Grand Champion Steer-Larry Kleffner, Grand Champion Lamb-Jerold Shirk, Grand Champion Barrow-Robert Schwartze, Reserve Champion Steer-Brian Schoene, Reserve Champion Barrow-Larry Kleffner, and Reserve Champion Lamb-Terry Shirk.

In 1986, the Officer Team was Mark Buechter-President, Chris Bray-Vice President, Kevin Tellman-Secretary, Andy Schwartze-Treasurer. Shannon Thompson-Reporter, and Chris Feeler-Sentinel. The advisor was Mr. Norman Hollis. In 1986, Larry Kleffner received the State Farmer Degree. He received this award at State FFA Convention in Columbia. He was the 14th Vienna FFA student to receive this honor. During the summer of 1986. Andrew Schwartze attended the State FFA Camp. Also, the Vienna FFA Barnwarming Queen was Julie Wansing. Shannon Thompson and Andrew Schwartze attended the National FFA Convention which was held in Kansas City. At the end of the year, Vienna FFA had its annual Banquet. At the Banquet. Shannon Thompson received the Star Greenhand award and William Roberson received the Star Chapter Award.



Crystal Shanks received the Star Greenhand degree and Bryan Gillispie received the Star Chapter Degree. 


The chapter has also had 6 students go on to be FFA advisers themselves

Belle FFA Chapter Mo0013 celebrates 90 years during commemoration week

BELLE—In honor of Future Farmers of America (FFA) Week, Belle FFA Chapter Mo0013 is celebrating its 90 year history with 101 student state degrees since Oct. 19, 1929, and 161 current active members.

Belle FFA

Advisors Chris Mertz, who teaches shop and agriculture classes, and Merita James, public speaking and greenhouse horticulture, share the chapter's historical records.

"We were among one of the first schools in the state to organize a chapter," James told The Advocate. "The first group to start the organization was smaller — we were part of the second group."

The first chapter members included Sammie Licklider, vice president, Roman S. Tellman, secretary, Clarence Klaas, Harold McQueen, Narorin Graff, and Raymond H. Garirer. Since the first president did not mark his station next to his name, that information has been lost. James said it would be a "he" because women were not allowed to join the chapter back then.


Mertz is the longest running Belle agriculture teacher

since the chapter began. He had worked at three previous school districts and started at Belle High School (BHS) in 2005-06. He has 28 years of experience total this year.

"When the Belle agriculture position came open, this is where my children went to school. I wanted to be here the longest," Mertz said. "I always heard stories of agriculture teachers going quick — staying two years minimum. But I wanted the program to have more stability than that."

When Mertz took the position in 2005, only 43 students had been awarded a state agriculture degree over the course of the program's 75 year history. Since he started teaching, 58 students have received their FFA state degrees. Mertz teaches students by the chapter's motto, "Learning to do, doing to learn, earning to live, living to serve."

"I saw a lot of potential here that I knew wasn't being reached," Mertz said about the beginning of his BHS teaching career. "I enjoy the contest side of things and encourage students to do more. That first year, my oldest son was a junior in high school and he and a friend were judging livestock in 4-H. I knew I had a really good group of kids that year."

In 2010 Belle FFA had their very first Missouri State Officer, Mareta James (Sherman) who served as the State Secretary. In 2014, Belle had their second State Officer, Paul Shanks who served as the State Vice President. The Belle FFA has many different successful pathways for its students from welding to the greenhouse.

In 2017, Belle FFA senior Collin Miller won 1st place at the MWI Welding Competition where he won a \$14,000 scholarship along with many other prizes. The chapter has had 11 other students place in the top ten at the MWI Welding Competition. Students who take the greenhouse pathway learn how to grow produce from seeds and sell plants to the community.

In 2017, Emily Koch placed 1st at State in the Young Farmers Young

The chapter is extremely successful with public speaking and contest teams. In spring of 2016, Amberely Sydner came to speak at Belle High School about how she over came a severe car accident and becoming paralyzed. Today, she has learned how to ride again and barrel races again.

In 2019, Natalie Koch became the third state officer for the Belle FFA, and is serving as State Vice President.

All three of Mertz's students from that first year went on to judge at the collegiate level, received their masters in agriculture and are working in the professional field. Mertz said he encourages his students to visit the Belle school and show other students what they could do.

"I had an idea because we had lived in the community for years and for years I was amazed at the quality of the agriculture program," he said. "They started the agriculture program here before FFA even began and it is my job to say 'hey, you can do this.'"

His first year's success only made him eager to see other Belle FFA members get to the top. Now out of 14 contest teams, 12 have made it to state.

(James) became Belle Chapter's first State FFA Officer.

"We just kept grinding away at contests and kicking out state degrees," Mertz said. "I had a vision to make Belle the top FFA and agriculture program in the area, and the first time we won state was when Merita and was here. She and the others that year were competitive."

James went on to college to graduate with an agriculture degree and came back to Belle to help teach the program. As co-advisors, Mertz said they get the students going and let them take initiative.

"Kids build confidence in themselves," Mertz said. "Our program, advisors and teachers say little."

The annual FFA Banquet is student led, along with many of the other chapter initiatives. Before they knew it, another member had broken into the state ranks. Paul Shanks became the second FFA State Officer from Belle, and now Natalie Koch is serving. Koch was recently featured on national TV on FFA Today.

"That's the rewarding part of this job," Mertz said. "To see students be successful in life."

The program has grown significantly since the beginning and especially in the last 15 years. Of the 235 students in the high school, 161 are involved in agriculture classes.

"It helped that a few years ago one of the teachers in the department went to the middle school part-time," Mertz said.

About 12 students a year receive scholarships to judge at the collegiate level and Division One level. Mertz keeps track of the agriculture graduates that are working towards a related field degree, including four already in the field and five in various stages of completing their agriculture degrees.

The local chapter has had some bumps along the way. It was temporarily closed from 1944 to 1948, while previously under the direction of J.W.

Stafford.

"Due to the war," Mertz said while showing a list of former agriculture teachers back to 1929. "The program picked back up after that (1948-49, under the direction of W. E. Foster)."

About 33 years later, the original shop burned down.

"I came and observed this class in the early 1980s and they were in a building downtown," Mertz remembers.

The current shop and classroom are the "new facilities," and where the current weight room is located in the back used to be the shop classroom.

"We have really good kids coming from here," James said.

"People not from here come here and say 'yeah, this cool stuff," Mertz said. The Belle FFA Chapter Mo0013 looks forward to another 90 years.




