
MO-Sci Foundation Scholarship



Lange said a highlight of his high school






career was going to building trades and having Andy Jones as a teacher.

it was going to be all that we had."

Natalie Bird said the best part of the year was the people she spent it with.

"Definitely being with classmates and the unpredictable things that happened this year," Bird said. "It was unpredictable, but it was awesome. The pandemic really made us value our time as a class, we didn't get our last goodbyes and all that. It was cut short. We really got to value that."

During a May 2020 interview class officers President Skylar Rice and Ethan Willis, treasurer, the two agreed there were memories they wanted to make and memories they didn't think would ever have happened.

"I was looking forward to the last few weeks of senior year when all the classes were wrapping up," Rice said. "Seniors were supposed to go to the park and get-togethers, and we can't have that anymore.

At the time, Willis was concerned he would never have that memory of walking across the stage with classmates or dancing at prom.

In true 2020 form, they did get those memories, but still not as expected, but 2020 gave a little back to the senior class too. Things other classes may never have.

"My favorite memory — lights at the softball field thing I would say is the biggest one," Rice said, referencing ways the community gave recognition to the seniors when their milestone events were canceled. "When I started my senior year, I never expected any of this to happen, that the only way to see friends was to park cars six feet away. The parade — I wouldn't have expected to see something like that. Seeing everyone in cars and the community coming forward to support us was nice."

Willis said his favorite memory was with his class.

"Doing our senior class dance, we danced to Spongebob Square Pants songs," Willis said.

For him, the parade was one memory he never expected to make. He said his senior year was short.

Rice says it was different.

"Senior year in general is different for everyone and this year for these seniors is different," she said. "No one has experienced what we have experienced. It's hard for people to sympathize with us. We did it differently, but it's not necessarily a bad thing. Just 'cause we can't be in class together doesn't stop us from talking to each other. It's different, but that is ok, because we make the most of what we got."

Rice and Willis had hoped for a day at the park with friends and a walk down the stage to get their diplomas. This is certainly a day they won't forget.


