#### This will be the one I've waited for...

n 2008, Len Whiteside would meet the love of his life at the United Methodist Church lock-in in Leslie—he was 14-years-old and she was maybe 12-years-old. "We then realized we went to school together," he said.

Toni (Henson) Whiteside says the meeting was purely coincidental since neither of them actually attended the Methodist Church.

"I was there with a friend and he was there with a friend who was also my cousin," she said. "But I have had a crush on him since I was 12 and saw him in gym class doing pushups. I thought, 'yep, that was the man I was going to marry.' It took 10 years before anything actually happened. I was pretty sure he had no clue who I was."

After that fateful meeting in 2008, the two remained fast



friends throughout their high school careers until Len's 2012 graduation from Owensville High School.

"Then I went to the military and she went to college," Len said. "We started writing letters."

"I wrote, you never wrote back," Toni clarified.

"I lost my stamps," Len said.

Len says, in his defense, Toni was only his second girlfriend.

"I guess that is why he asked me to marry him," Toni jokes. "He figured he is in too deep now, no backing out!"

The next day after their outing, Lenn went on a two-and-ahalf-week road trip with a fellow military buddy.

The confusion over whether or not their outing meant what she hoped it meant came at the worst time. Toni was attending school at Maryville University in St. Louis to be a nurse and between wondering about Len, she was trying to study and take her finals.

"While we were both in school, we saw each other every weekend and did stuff together. We were both active about trying new things, going out to eat, and going places—we took a lot of hikes that first year."

Toni said 2019 was just dating, getting to know each other. Len was friends with her cousin and some of her family members, so he already knew most of Toni's family. Len was sure he knew what he wanted for their future, and began searching for the perfect ring.

Toni's birthday is in October — a month whose Zodiac sign features an airy Libra and an opal gemstone — which Toni wanted to include in her future wedding ring.

"I sent a few ideas to her best friend," Len admits. "Her friend was living in Texas at the time."

Despite not being able to find what he


wanted in a local jewelry store, Len said didn't feel right about purchasing a wedding ring off the internet.

"I had an inside guy," Len laughs. "John got us dinner reservations, and Mel, who was pregnant, volunteered to be our designated driver. We always went to different wineries and made sure to end at Stone Hill because that was where I planned to propose."

Toni had planned on a smaller group of people because of COVID but said more people kept getting invited.

"I didn't know that all these people knew," she said. "I just knew that it went from a small gathering to everyone."

Everyone present knew Len was planning to propose. Len's stepmom had cookies and cups made that had the word "fiance" scrawled on them in celebration of Toni saying yes.

Toni's mother and sister who were present thought that the proposal wasn't supposed to happen until later in the evening when they were expected at a friend's house for a bonfire. For the past year, Toni and Len's love story has been saturated with perfect timing, but

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






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the COVID-19 Pandemic was about to put a hiccup in their wedding planning. Their parents and an honorary parent have professional backgrounds in the medical field and each one advised them not to attempt to get married in 2021 during the pandemic.

"It was 2020 so we were like 'we will give the world time to calm down," Toni said. "Everyone said 'don't do it in 2021' but no one remembers saying that."

Plus, they were both still in college.

The longer-than-usual engagement didn't stop the couple from jumping on board the wedding planning train.

They set a date the very next day — May 21, 2022.

Toni purchased a dress that was nothing like she thought she wanted.

And the couple discovered their theme. "That was the theme of our wedding," Toni said. "Unique and steeped in —,"

"Etsy," Len said.

"— Tradition and sentiment," Toni countered

#### Champagne, ivory, and lace dress

"One of the first things I did was get a dress about a month after we got engaged," Toni said. "When I bought my dress, I had my mom sister, and niece. We went to Goddess Gowns (formerly Margos) in Union."

Toni thought she knew what she wanted a princess gown full of fluff and tulle but they made her try on the exact opposite.

"I wanted a big, fun, twirly ballgown and they put me in mermaid style with lots of lace and sequins," Toni said. "It was on sale so that made it better. Champagne, ivory, complete with lace overlay and sparkles throughout. Lace sleeves and buttons down the back. It had an open back with a beaded necklace that draped."

The beads were an addition to the dress that Toni instantly fell in love with.

"It gave it an extra pop of flair," she said.

## A brief pause

After she purchased the dress, Toni and Len took a break from wedding planning as she was graduating from college and completing board exams, Len began a new job and they both eventually moved back home to Owensville.

They did manage to contract with ven-

"The DJ accidentally double booked between his band and DJ services, but he had a backup that did a great job," Toni said.

#### Location, location

It was the location of their wedding, which Len and Toni decided should be outside, that took the longest amount of time to decide. They decided on Sweet Clover Farm near Hermann

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"We spent a long time trying to find a venue," Toni said. "We toured four or five and all had one day of availability and they were expensive."

The big-name venues near Owensville didn't provide the couple with the exclusivity and privacy that they wanted for their event.

"We were looking for outdoor and unique," Toni said. "Sweet Clover Farm wasn't a place everyone we knew had already been to. It was affordable. We came across Sweet Clover Farms and loved it, loved the packages available, loved that we could choose how long we wanted it for for the weekend, they supplied some decor, we could choose our own vendors and they had separate rooms for the bridal party and groom to get ready."

The morning of May 21 dawns rainy with dark clouds.

"It was raining," Toni said.

"I was late," Len added.

Toni said God was testing Len's resolve.

"He said he wasn't going to show up if it was raining," Toni laughed. "God was saying, 'how much do you want this?""

The rain was only the first part of it though.

"My hairdresser didn't show up," Toni said. "There was a miscommunication, she wasn't aware we were confirmed for that date. It was 9 in the morning and nine of us needed our hair done."

Luckily the bride's sister is a barber and recently began working at Great Reflections.

"She called in an emergency team that consisted of everyone who was available. My best friend Carly called her stepmom, Christy, who was a hairstylist. We called everyone and said to bring everything! Bring curling irons and bobby pins and hairspray."

"She made sure nothing got through to me," Toni said. "I thought hair was the only issue. But apparently, Mel did such a

good job."

Melonie bounced between the bridesmaids and groomsmen to make sure everyone was where they needed to be for pictures and set up.

Toni was finally getting ready. Britni Echols was in charge of makeup.

"The girls were frantically getting hair and makeup done and the guys were drinking beer, moving benches, escorting guests through the river of the parking lot," Toni said. "Everything went smoothly aside from the rain and hairdresser."

Len claims the groomsmen had better luck than the bridesmaids, however, he said the shirt that came with his tuxedo was too small

"I wore it." Len said. "They had to help me put on my vest because I couldn't reach the back to put it on."

Once the bridesmaids were dressed, each with a different color palette and hair finished, Toni said it was a scramble with three different people trying to get her ready and into her dress on time. "We took two bottles of whiskey and poured them into a barrel," Toni said.

"We got two bottles of unaged corn whiskey, it is moonshine but legal to sell, and we poured it into our own oak barrel so it could age together like us," Len added.

"People really thought it was creative and we wanted something fun, unique and usable for later," Toni said. "We have tried it, it is delicious. It has aged and has a nice oaky taste from the barrel."

The barrel is from Pinky Bend in New

"Not that anyone could hear the music we spent hours picking out," Toni said. "We did a walkout meet and greet with everyone, but it was still raining and no one wanted to go out on the back patio."

Shortly after the ceremony, the group left with the photographer for pictures. The bridesmaids' dresses stood out against the dreary day in pastel blue, ivory, pink, green and some gray.

"After the ceremony, before the dancing, we took pictures while it was still raining,' Toni said. "The boys helped hold up dresses and everyone had a different color umbrella. It was not planned, we stepped in a lot of puddles, and my shoes were wet."

They also had the photographer take a picture of all the wedding guests.

"I even had the photographer do a photo of our entire wedding, of us, the wedding party and all guests," she said. "It stopped being fun mid-way through when my feet were wet, I was hungry."

Pictures were cut short as more rain

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

# The tradition of raising a glass and toasting may be very, very old

f the ancient Greeks and Romans could be magically transported to modern times, chances are strong that much of our current customs would register as foreign. But one particular custom that's part and parcel of New Year's Eve celebrations across the globe might feel more familiar to our hypothetical time travelers.

Historians differ as to the origins of the toast,

toasting. In fact, during the reign of Emperor Augustus, who was the first official Roman emperor and reigned from 27 BC to AD 14, the Senate decreed that everyone must drink to Augustus at every meal.

Since ancient times, various traditions have incorporated raising a glass, whether it's filled with wine, champagne or another beverage. This tradition, now known as "toasting," might be employed to pay homage to a particular individual, wish goodwill upon an individual or individuals

(such as at a wedding) or simply in celebration of a special event or day, which is the case when the clock strikes 12 midnight on New Year's Eve.

Regardless of who was the first person to raise a glass to honor or celebrate a special individual or occasion, there's no denying this much-enjoyed tradition has a very, very lengthy history.

For example, couples working within a strict budget may not be able to afford a preferred venue during the height of wedding season, but that venue could be less costly during slower times of year. By waiting to pick a date until you've chosen a venue, you're increasing your options.

• Consider your guests. Though couples,

particularly those footing the bill on their own, should prioritize their desires when choosing a reception, it's important they also consider their guests before making a final decision. A venue that's accessible and located near transit hubs like airports and train stations will increase the likelihood that more people can attend. In addition, if children will be invited, a venue that includes family restrooms, including at least one with a changing table, can make parents' nights much easier.

• Consider your budget. The Knot 2021 Real Weddings Study found that couples typically spend around 30 percent of their

overall budget on the venue, which makes this decision the biggest one in terms of the financial commitments a couple will have to make. Couples may be tempted to choose an awe-inspiring, costly venue for their reception, but they should consider how devoting so much of their budget to the venue will affect the rest of their big day. The best reception venue might be one that won't eat up too much of your budget.

• Consider the package. Venues vary in terms of their reception packages. Some may offer catering, including beverages, with each of their packages, while food and beverage might not be part of other venues' offerings. If you find a venue you love but it doesn't offer catering services, seek estimates from area caterers to determine how much it will cost to feed and serve your guests. Many couples find it more convenient and less stressful to pick a venue that offers on-site catering, though plenty of others have had no trouble after choosing a venue and separate caterer.

The bulk of a couple's wedding day and night will be spent at the reception, making choice of venue one of the more fun and important decisions they'll have to make.

## Jat & Taylor Ridenhour, Sept. 24, 2022



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
